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

A word from the Founder and Director **Ghida ANANI**

As the world slowly emerges from the COVID-19 pandemic, Lebanon remains stuck in a state of ongoing crises. By March of this year, 3 million people in Lebanon were estimated to be in poverty as the standard of living continues to worsen, restricting affordability and access to essential goods and services. It goes without saying that, in such contexts, risks of violence against women and girls surge. This is evident by the fact that calls received to our helplines have increased by more than 200% since the beginning of the pandemic. Still, women and girls in Lebanon are generally reluctant to report violence in times like this. To better understand the situation on the ground, we conducted a nationwide survey which revealed that 96% of domestic violence in Lebanon went unreported in 2021 by young women and girls who had experienced it. While there are different reasons for this, the main one is the non-prioritization of women's rights in the country, given that all eves are now diverted towards the socio-economic crisis. We are here to change that.

ABAAD is working on all fronts to ensure that women's protection is a priority during the ongoing crisis and that gender equality and reform stay at the top of the agenda. Besides continuously providing timely life-saving interventions and services to survivors of gender-based violence and those at risk, we found new and innovative ways to campaign and advocate against violence. We worked on strengthening national and regional capacities and published practical resources and guidelines, including on remote GBV case management during emergencies.

2021 marked the formation of a new government in Lebanon which reflected a drastic step back in women's representation in politics. ABAAD joined forces with other civil society organizations in Lebanon, demanding legally binding measures that ensure women's rights to equal participation in decision-making. A year after the Beirut Blast, we also reiterated the call for an independent investigation and to integrate a gender lens in actions taken. Additionally, we developed a training module for the Internal Security Forces (ISF) around the sexual harassment law 205, passed by the Lebanese Parliament in December 2020. Our hope is that strengthening officers' response to sexual harassment incidents will restore confidence in the criminal justice system. We worked with different partners to raise awareness about this new law and highlighted the internal policies needed to make sure it is rightfully implemented.

As we look ahead, we know we will face another challenging year. But we also know that we have the devotion it takes to make a change. It is not an easy journey, but it is worth it. Until then, we will do everything we can to ensure that women's rights remain a priority, even (and especially) during this crisis.

Thank you to the women and girls who trust ABAAD and go out of their way to come forward and speak up. Thank you to our partners and donors who visit these women in our safe shelters and listen to their stories. Finally, thank you to all our supporters who engage with our campaigns & reform actions!

Remember, it is always time to address women's safety and speak about gender equality.

Contextual Highlights

For the past three years, Lebanon has been facing overlapping crises and struggling with the worst economic situation in its history. The COVID-19 pandemic and the Beirut Blast further exacerbated people's vulnerability and increased social and political turmoil. Needless to mention that Lebanon was already reeling from the Syrian crisis and the massive influx of Syrian refugees to the country, which posed immense challenges given the lack of adequate resources, weak public sector, and poor infrastructure. The compounded crises have increased risks of gender-based violence, especially for women and girls.

GBV in Lebanon

Eighteen women lost their lives in 2021 due to domestic violence.

Among domestic violence cases reported to the ISF in 2021, the perpetrator was the partner in 57% of cases, the father in 14%, and the brother in 8%. In 57% of cases, the victim called the hotline herself, while the neighbors called in 15% of cases.

ABAAD received a total of 3,600 calls to its helplines.

Calls received on ABAAD Helpline have increased by more than 200% since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic. With the economic situation deteriorating in Lebanon, the number of calls continues to increase.

Women and Girls Safe Spaces (WGSS)

A total of 20,912 beneficiaries accessed ABAAD Safe Spaces

and were provided with comprehensive prevention and rsponse services by ABAAD's psychosocial support workers. Located at the Social Development Centres (SDCs) of the Lebanese Ministry of Social Affairs, ABAAD's 26 WGSSs provide direct GBV prevention and response services across Lebanon.



Stories from the field

Caregiving sessions improve family relations

Riwa is a mom of young children living in a crowded neighborhood around Beirut. In early 2021, she enrolled in a workshop that took place at ABAAD Women and Girls Safe Space (WGSS) in Mount Lebanon. During the first session, Riwa confided to the social worker, explaining that she treated her children violently, and she was struggling from the poor relationship with her husband and children.

After listening to the social worker's advice, Riwa enrolled in 'Positive Parenting and caregiving' sessions.

"Right after the third session, I started noticing that my behavior at home is changing. I was more attentive to my children's needs, and keen to have a relationship based on trust and cooperation. The entire atmosphere of the house was greatly improved. Even my husband was positively influenced by this improved environment at home, and became less nervous than before. My family and I benefited a lot." - Riwa


15-year-old Syrian refugee is protected from child marriage

Salam contacted ABAAD to seek support as her father was forcing her into an early marriage. Salam's mother explains: "My daughter's marriage was expected to take place during the summer. I did not agree to it but it is my husband who takes the decisions at home". ABAAD's team provided case management services to this family for over a vear. After several consultation sessions with Salam and her mother, ABAAD's case worker was able to reach out to the child's father to provide counseling services without directly addressing the issue of child marriage that he was reluctant to discuss. The family enrolled in several sessions to help address hardship, conjugal problems, socio-economic difficulties, protection concerns and threats. After one year of counseling and follow-up by the team of social workers and psychologists, the father's perceptions had evolved, and he agreed to not force his daughter's marriage. Salam can now live her life as a 15-year-old, working to build her personality and focus on her studies.

Al Dar Emergency shelter for women & girls:

A total of 113 women were admitted to ABAAD's three Mid-Way houses across Lebanon, accompanied by 133 children.

A total of 926 individuals received counselling sessions and more than 500 in-house psychotherapy sessions, 129 in-house legal services, and 795 emotional psychosocial support sessions. Children residing in the shelters (boys and girls) were also targeted with non-formal education sessions.


Men Center

71 men and boys were provided with mental health services at the Men center. A total of 169 psychotherapy sessions were given to the beneficiaries. ABAAD's certified psychotherapists focused on positive masculinities and addressing the root causes of violent behavior.

Anger and stress management helps a father regain self-confidence and his family's trust

Jamil is a husband and father who describes himself as an emotional person. He prioritizes his family over everything else. A hard-working employee, he suffered, like many others in the past 2 years, from the collapse of the Lebanese economy. He explains: "with the crisis, I witnessed the dismissal of most of my colleagues. I arrived at work every day anxious that it would be my last day. It began to reflect negatively on my personality, I was always tense, temperamental, and nervous. Things escalated and reflected negatively on my family, my wife and children, whom I love more than anything. My children started avoiding me. Things were slipping away from me." Concerned, Jamil's wife started attending psychosocial support sessions at ABAAD center, which helped her a lot. She was able to convince her husband to visit the ABAAD's Men Center. He stated: "The sessions on anger management on how to deal with stress helped me regain some self confidence in my abilities and skills. It's not magic but it did help. I became more aware of the tools for dismantling problems and dealing with pressures through positive thinking. I didn't solve all the issues in my life, but we were able to improve things in our family. My wife and I are now more supportive of each other and we play complementary roles to raise our children".

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Impact of interventions

62% of the women and girls benefiting from WGSS activities in 2021 reported feeling safe at school, at home, and in the community at large based on a recent evaluation.

72% of WGSS beneficiaries, both from the host and refugee communities, reported positive feelings and better functionality.

93% of beneficiaries reported very high overall satisfaction from the WGSS services.

"Without case management and the support that I found here with the ABAAD team, I wouldn't have been able to move out from the situation I was in, having been married at age 15 and going through a painful divorce. Now I found myself, I understand and acknowledge my feelings, and I know I deserve better and that I can do it. I do not feel ashamed about it or care about what other people think. I have acquired some recovery techniques through the psychosocial support sessions that can help me overcome the difficulties and reconstruct myself" - Suha, Bekaa

"I kept on receiving multiple threats from my husband, and my son was emotionally abused. But with the support of the ABAAD's team of social workers, and the psychological and legal support I received, I remained strong and was able to support myself and my son who needs me"- Luna from Kenya, Mount Lebanon

We experience psychological stress daily, and I am conscious that it affects my relationship with my children, since I often have negative reactions and violent behavior. I appreciate all the support and guidance I receive to educate my children in a healthier, more positive way. I am excited to complete the rest of the sessions and I really am in the process of making serious change!" – Sherine, Beqaa



Capacity strengthening and gender integration

ABAAD scaled up its work in supporting organizations in better integrating gender into different sectors of humanitarian and development programming. Several organizations benefited from ABAAD's gender technical support, tackling gender sensitivity, integration and gender transformation approaches.

Generation G

The Generation G partnership is a collaboration of partners in seven countries (Indonesia, Jordan, Lebanon, Morocco, Rwanda, South Africa and Uganda) with regional and global-level support. With a global consortium consisting of Rutgers (lead), ABAAD, Promundo and Sonke, the Generation G partnership raises public support, advocates for improved policies and laws, and strengthens civil society as a way to contribute to gender justice. The partnership addresses three key interrelated challenges: gender-based violence, the unequal division of care and women's lack of access to civic space. More specifically, this partnership engages an innovative gender-transformative strategy that equips youth leaders and civil society organizationns (CSOs) to address the root causes of gender inequality and power imbalances. ABAAD and its country partner, Justice without Frontiers (JWF), kick-started the collaboration and defined the thematic focus of advocacy and work with the youth and women-led CSOs in Lebanon. To ensure gender equality in Lebanon remains at the top of the agenda, ABAAD and JWF will focus their interventions around UNSC 1325 resolution on Women, Peace and Security, the Lebanese National Action Plan and the Women's Strategy.

Strengthening Civil Courage (SCC)

ABAAD, PAX, Amnesty International and DefendDefenders joined forces to form the Strengthening Civil Courage (SCC) alliance with the support of the Dutch Ministry of Foreign Affairs. This five-year program aims to protect and strengthen civic space, work on gender equality, support activists and youth leaders working on peace and human rights and push for international regulation of external stress factors in 14 countries.

ABAAD, along with the alliance gender working group, laid the groundwork for gender mainstreaming and integration approach and provided technical support to country teams.

ABAAD developed a gender capacity assessment survey targeting local partners to inform country-level capacity strengthening needs. The survey showed that the most-needed topics are gender integration, men and masculinities in peacebuilding, gender-sensitive conflict analysis, and movement building for gender equality. In 2022, ABAAD will deliver introductory gender integration trainings for partners, both in-person and online.

PAX and ABAAD started connecting influential professionals and organizations to create a collaborative network working on masculinities and engaging men within conflict transformation. These connections initially aimed at peer exchange, advocacy and programming.

Partners for Justice

The Partners for Justice Project is funded by the Bureau of Democracy, Human Rights and Labor Affairs, United States Department of State (DRL) and collaboratively implemented by Search for Common Ground and ABAAD. It seeks to reduce VAWG in Lebanon by addressing its root causes and shifting attitudes towards patriarchal norms that define masculinity in public and private spheres. ABAAD provided a series of trainings to youth organizations and members of the Men Engage Network in Lebanon on masculinities, gender concepts and norms, training of trainers and coaching sessions on Program Ra.

Indashykirwa Innovative curriculum to support Women's Economic Participation

Indashyikirwa, which means "agents of change" in Kinyarwanda, is a programme that aims to reduce intimate partner violence (IPV) and shift attitudes, behaviours and social norms. ABAAD in partnership with UNDP Lebanon and ACTED, adapted the Indashyikirwa model for 250 individuals from the Syrian refugee and Lebanese host communities. In line with the Women's Economic Participation (WEP) project integrating GBV prevention strategies, a series of 3 webinars were hosted by UNDP to discuss the insights of the program in Lebanon.

"One has to start with himself. Some men use violence to express themselves, and society gives them excuses. But violence against women and children doesn't have any justification"- a man who participated in the Indashykirwa Couple's curriculum.

"Gender roles usually give women minor responsibilities, and do not offer protection. These are topics we do not get to talk about in our environment" – a women enrolled in the Indashykirwa Couple's curriculum.



Reaching the unreachable

Jina Al-Dar is a bus touring Lebanon's most marginalized areas, towns and villages, with a specialized team that provides GBV prevention and response services. The philosophy of Jina Al-Dar is to reach to the unreachable.

In 2019, Jina Al-Dar was selected as one of the 10 most innovative projects worldwide at the UN Solutions Summit.

The Jina Al-Dar team carried out 15 mobile rounds of interventions, offering GBV awareness and psychosocial support sessions to more than 860 women among the host and refugee communities in geographically, socially and economically deprived localities in Lebanon.

Additionally, more than **1,000 children** participated in the 'Playing for Equality' curriculum activities, such as puppet-making workshops and interactive theater. Activities focused around storytelling to encourage their imagination using words such as "I feel safe", "I express my feelings". ABAAD also distributed over 400 puzzles including a Q&A game for children on gender perceptions.

"We had so much fun today! We miss having activities and games! Please come back for more play!" – Samir, 9-year-old attendee in El Bireh, Akkar.

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Stand-up initiative

In partnership with L'Oréal, ABAAD kicked off a series of training targeting primarily youth on harassment in public spaces. The global curriculum presents the 5D's methodology which encourages bystander intervention when experiencing or witnessing harassment. Several influencers attended the launching event on November 25, and widely disseminated the 5D approach on their social media platforms.

Training the Internal Security Forces to better respond to SGBV cases

ABAAD continues to collaborate with the Internal Security Forces in Lebanon with support from UNFPA and RDPP. 60 ISF members received trainings on several topics that aimed to build their capacities, including the law 205 and human trafficking. ABAAD also encouraged focusing on the psychological considerations when dealing with men with abusive behaviors and/or women survivors.



Women in peace building processes

ABAAD worked alongside the Women's International League for Peace & Freedom (WILPF) to adopt and encourage the theory of change related to UN Security Council Resolution 1325: If knowledge and information around integrating women in peace and stability processes at the grassroots level, and capacity building is done at the community and institutional level through participatory approaches, then inclusion of women in peace and stability processes is enhanced. Based on that, ABAAD disseminated the produced and developed national toolkit and translated it into English. Complementary resources and IEC materials were developed for dissemination and advocacy purposes among protection, humanitarian, and security actors. ABAAD consulted with stakeholders throughout the development of the key messages and informative materials & pamphlets to ensure WPS is mainstreamed across the different humanitarian sectors in Lebanon.

Co-chairing the 'Prevention from Sexual Exploitation and Abuse' program in Lebanon

Due to the degrading social, political and economic situation in the country, and following the Beirut blast, the affected population's vulnerabilities and protection concerns have increased critically. ABAAD assumed its mandate as co-chair of the Lebanon PSEA In-Country Network and provided trainings to CSOs and frontliners on Accountability to Affected Population and PSEA, GBV Case management and gender integration.

ABAAD technically supported the network in strengthening the humanitarian sector's protective mechanisms against SEA and provided training sessions to more than humanitarian staff members from national and international entities in Lebanon. In addition, IEC materials on PSEA under the OCHA/LHF supported project were developed and disseminated across local and international humanitarian agencies, including videos, PSEA toolkit, and the upgrade of ABAAD's mobile application: SEA Lebanon



GBV awareness to the Mexican and Latino community in Lebanon

In collaboration with the Embassy of Mexico in Lebanon, ABAAD provided a 3-day training to the Consular Section staff on GBV core concepts and safe identification and referrals. The GBV IEC materials were translated into Spanish and were disseminated to the Mexican and Latino community in Lebanon during the event on November 25 held at the Mexican Embassy premises.



AIOMIS program

In 2020, ABAAD started the development of its integrated online webbased monitoring and evaluation management information system (AIOIMS) with support from RDPP. The system provides real-live data tracking, monitoring, and evaluation, with a central database network for case management activities. At the end of 2021, ABAAD trained its staff on the AIOMIS and launched the program officially. ABAAD is now adopting progressive and innovative approaches towards monitoring and evaluation, and is planning further upgrades in 2022 to capture all activities.





Advocacy & Lobbying

Call to Action on Protection from Gender-Based Violence in Emergencies (CTA)

ABAAD served a two-year term as co-chair to the Call-to-Action network until December 2021, actively engaging with the network at the level of planning and advocacy.



United Nations Generation Equality Forum

ABAAD was one of the few local organizations from the MENA region to be selected as co-lead (until 2025) of the Generation Equality Action Coalition on gender-based violence. ABAAD contributed to the development of the <u>action coalition's</u> action plan and participated in a number of international forums, including the official Commemoration of the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women, and the Generation Equality Forum in Mexico and Paris. ABAAD Founder and Director, Ghida Anani, <u>addressed</u> the French and Mexican governments and global leaders, highlighting ABAAD's efforts in reinforcing the criminalization of sexual and gender-based violence in all its forms in Lebanon.

Lebanon's Feminist Civil Society Platform

ABAAD and other members of Lebanon's Feminist Civil Society Platform issued a <u>statement</u> demanding fair and equitable space for women in the public sphere. Additionally, a year after the Beirut Blast, the network released a <u>statement</u> to reiterate its call for a credible and independent investigation and the need to take gendered needs and concerns into account to ensure women's inclusion in the response.



Campaigns

The "Dayman Waata" (#Priority_Too) campaign

On the occasion of the 16 days of activism to end violence against women and girls, ABAAD launched this campaign to raise awareness about women's protection issues amidst the different crises in Lebanon. The key message which was "Women Safety is a Priority Too" resonated with the public at large, across all communities.

The campaign was designed to raise awareness of a recent national ABAAD survey, which shows one out of two women in Lebanon considers that women's protection should be a priority during the ongoing crisis that the country is witnessing, whereas 96% of young girls and women residing in Lebanon who have experienced domestic violence in 2021 stated that they had never reported it.

ABAAD released a short video across its platforms on social media, featuring women confronted to violence in various situations.

in addition, several influencers relayed the campaign messages on social media through their own videos and posts, creating a trending buzz on all platforms at the occasion of the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women and Girls on November 25. On the ground, various stunts took place in different locations, with

women holding up signs that highlight the dilemma of favoring a specific Lebanese priority (i.e. lack of electricity, hunger, etc) versus the protection of women living in Lebanon against abuse.

As part of the campaign, ABAAD and a group of activists participated in the Beirut International Marathon holding signs 'Women safety can't wait'.

Recolor your life

177 women and survivors of violence and abuse participated in various art-form workshops, facilitated by seven local artists. They were given the tools and materials to design 10 art installations during the 16 Days of Activism to fight violence against women and girls. The installations were placed in public spaces and became the talk of the town. Messages of hope, perseverance, and a willingness to survive and overcome adversity and challenges were underscored and shared across all creations. Prime locations were successfully secured with the help of the municipalities and the local communities and passersby enquired about the artwork to the team and were sensitized on Violence against women and girls and the 16 days campaign. The women also enrolled in awareness and PSS sessions conducted by ABAAD.

The sessions included 'concepts of Gender-Based Violence', 'My self-esteem is a must in my life', 'I am unique', 'I want to become'

The campaign was implemented with support from UNFPA, and the financial support of the Government of Canada, and in partnership with the Ministry of Social Affairs' Development Services Centers and several municipalities.



The Positive Fatherhood Campaign

Around Father's day, ABAAD launched five videos recorded with fathers along with their kids. The campaign demonstrated the effectiveness of engaging fathers and helping them learn and apply non-violent behavior and positive parenting, while committing to gender equitable roles within their families. 
Women Day 2021:

Webinars & public talks

ABAAD participated in the "Sharing key learning and messages from Lebanon to secure a better future for women in Afghanistan" open debate launched by UNDP. Addressing women organizations, Ghida Anani stated: "It is key to ensure that women movements keep a continuous dialogue to reach unified plan and objectives, even if your approaches are different. Educate yourself about women rights issues because knowledge is power, and power with perseverance can bring change".

During this webinar organized by Girls not Brides entitled "Child Marriage in Humanitarian Settings", ABAAD shared the key takeaways from the CRANK- Research Meeting: "Effective, evident based and meaningful child participation is key in designing ending child marriage programming. Greater coordination across sectors is a must to mitigate risks of child marriage and respond to the needs of survivors." ABAAD participated in the technical workshop "Building forward better together: finding solutions to enable civil society" organized as part of the OECD's Civil society Days. Anthony Keedi, Masculinities Technical Advisor, stated: "I want to see more accountability in combatting out cultures of impunity," highlighting the need to target hidden power structures in our efforts to dismantle patriarchy.






