When daughters and sons observe their fathers being respectful and non-violent in egalitarian relationships with their mothers and other women, they internalize the idea that men and women are equal and that intimate partners treat each other with respect and care.



Did You Know?

Men who witnessed their fathers using violence against their mothers, and men who experienced some form of violence at home as children, are significantly more likely to perpetrate intimate partner violence in their own adult relationships. (IMAGES-MENA)




Figure: Percentage of respondents who agreed or strongly agreed with attitudes around gender roles.

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

Did You Know?

Global statistics speak loud and clear on who mostly cares for children in their first years of life. Even with all the advances towards equality for women over the past 20 years, women around the world still spend, on average, 3 times as much time caring for children and their homes as compared to men and fathers.

• Fathers need to know that, together with other family members, they are the ones who are also teaching their children how to identify an emotion and how to express it.



Remember

- The unequal power dynamics' between men and women in intimate relationships can have serious repercussions for the risks /exposure to violence and the overall well-being of the family.
- It is the responsibility of all individuals, women and men, to strive to raise boys and men, as well as girls and women, to understand how violence prevents individuals from building positive and loving relationships. It is commonly assumed that perpetrating violence is a "natural" or "normal" part of being a man. Just as violence is learned, it can be unlearned and prevented especially for the protection of women's and children's rights.
- We expect mothers to be the primary caregivers and sources of affection. It is important to critically examine these assumed roles and decide for ourselves the type of fathers we want in society.

IMAGES MENA Report on Lebanon 2017 showed that 46.5% of men answered "True" to the statement: "Husband's role in caring for the children at home is mostly as their financial provider." in comparison to 75.3% of women.

What is Programme ABB?

Programme ABB is a fatherhood training programme that engages men through their identity as fathers to learn about gender equality, masculinities and femininities, violence against women and girls, positive parenting, and healthy emotional expression and communication. Throughout the implementation process, these men and their partners discuss gender dynamics with regards to decision-making within the home, healthy communication, emotional expression, and positive discipline.

Program Objectives

Programme ABB's overall goal is for men and their partners to learn through questioning and critically reflecting on gender norms, exercise equitable and nonviolent attitudes and behaviors in a comfortable space, and internalize these new gender attitudes and norms, applying them in their own relationships and lives. Ultimately, this process contributes to achieving three objectives:

- Gender equity, meaning fairness and justice in the distribution of opportunities, responsibilities, and benefits available to men and women, as well as the strategies and processes used to achieve gender equality. (Greene, M. E., & Levack, A, USAID, 2010).
- Attitude and behavior changes at the individual and community levels that lead to transformed gender norms within specific objectives.
- Ensuring the sustainability of integrated care for every child during the early childhood stage through safe and sound parenting practices.
